Since the Research Challenge Trust Fund ("Bucks for Brains") program was created in 1997, the state has matched more than \$78 million in private gifts for U of L. About two-thirds of our Bucks for Brains funding goes to medicine, science and engineering—all key areas of economic growth.

GRAWEMEYER AWARDS

Each year, the Grawemeyer foundation at U of L awards \$1 million, with the winners in each category receiving a prize of \$200,000.

Established in 1984 by the late Charles Grawemeyer, a U of L alumnus, the awards are the first major international prizes to honor powerful ideas in the arts and sciences rather than personal achievement.
